## ACCOMMODATIONS AND TRANSPORTATION

Out-of-town participants for the North American Labor History Conference are encouraged to use the Hotel St. Regis, located in the New Center area just north of campus, during their stay.

If you register before October 1, 1997, you will be assured the special institutional discount rate of \$69 for a single room and \$79 for a double room. Just indicate that you will be attending the North American Labor History Conference at Wayne State University to lock in your room rate.

Unfortunately, Wayne State University cannot guarantee the institutional room rate for hotel reservations made after October 1, 1997. Standard rates at the Hotel St. Regis are \$99 for a single room and \$109 for a double room. Hotel reservations made after October 1 are not secured and will depend upon availability. For reservations, contact the Hotel St. Regis, 3071 W. Grand Blvd., Detroit, Michigan, 48202, U.S.A., phone: 313/873-3000, fax: 313/873-2574.

The Hotel St. Regis will offer a limited shuttle service between the hotel and the campus for conference participants free of charge. This service will bring participants to campus prior to the beginning session each day and will return participants to the hotel after the last session each evening. A sign-up sheet will be located at the hotel desk for persons wishing to use the shuttle service.

We suggest that out-of-town participants consider using Commuter Transport as a shuttle between the airport and the hotel. In our survey of Detroit transport services, it appears that Commuter provides the most convenient and economical shuttle between the airport and the Hotel St. Regis.
